

What is the sum of the angles inside a triangle?


180°




This can be proven in a number of different ways

Classifying Triangles by Sides


• Equilateral - Three congruent sides



• Isosceles - Two congruent sides




• Scalene - No congruent sides




Classifying Triangles by Angles


- Acute - All three angles $< 90^\circ$



- Equiangular - All three angles = 60°



- Right - One right angle




- Obtuse - One obtuse angle



Exterior Angle Theorem

The measure of an exterior angle of a triangle is equal to the sum of the measures of its remote interior angles


Remote Interior Angles



$$m\angle 4 = m\angle 1 + m\angle 2$$

Third Angle Theorem

If two angles of one triangle are congruent to two angles of another triangle, then the third pair of angles are congruent.



If this is true then

$$\angle A \cong \angle P$$


$$\angle B \cong \angle Q$$

$$\angle C \cong \angle R$$

Third Angle Theorem

If two angles of one triangle are congruent to two angles of another triangle, then the third pair of angles are congruent.



Classifying Triangles by Sides


Find the values of x , y , and the measures of the sides of each triangle
